
Shoreline Snapshots: Update

Whitehall Park has a new Chronolog!

With the introduction of Chronolog stations, we can monitor sea level rise and marsh erosion through photo submissions. Each station has directions on how to take and submit photos, so you can help monitor local ecosystems while getting a nice scenic view.

Spring has arrived in the Lowcountry, bringing warmer days, blooming flowers, and renewed activity across our natural environment. As temperatures rise, many creatures become more active after the cooler winter months, including the majestic American Alligator. Like all other reptiles that reside with us here in Beaufort County, they spend their days basking in the sun to regulate their body temperature and gain the energy to spend their evenings and early mornings to move about in search of food and mates.



While it can be exciting to see these ancient reptiles in the wild, it's important to keep a few things in mind:

- · Always observe alligators from a distance and never approach
- Never feed or harass them
- Avoid swimming or playing near areas with known Alligator activity
- · Keep pets on a leash and away from the water's edge
