- 1.6. Proxies
 - Herbert Glaze to Gerald Dawson; Lisa Sulka to Chair; Henry Lawton and Michael Sweeney absent without proxy. The meeting proceeded with a quorum present.

 - MOVED by Joe Flowers, seconded by Brian Flewelling to approve the minutes as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

2. Presentation

- 2.1. Presentation of the New LCOG Website Kimberly Mullinax and Jonathan Sherwood
 - The LCOG Website has been redesigned under contract by Revize. Led by Mullinax and Sherwood, LCOG staff worked as a team on its design.

 - There has been a website editor appointed from each department to maintain up-to-date information.

Resolution SFY2015-2016 authorizing the Executive Director to file application with the South Carolina Department of Transportation on the behalf of Hampton and Jasper County Councils on Aging for federal and/or state funding to assist in providing community and/or human services transportation services.  - This resolution allows LCOG to receive and manage senior transportation funds for Hampton and Jasper Councils on Aging.

4. New Business

- 4.1. SCDOT Project Progress Report Joy Riley
 - Joy Riley reported the status of the SCDOT road and bridge projects underway or pending for Beaufort, Colleton, Hampton and Jasper Counties. A detailed report outlining projects by county was distributed.
- 4.2. Lowcountry Regional Development Corporation (LRDC) Regular Meeting Sabrena Graham & Michelle Knight
 - MOVED by Joe Flowers, and approved by consensus to call the LRDC Meeting to order.
 The meeting was called to order at 6:56 pm.
 - 4.2.1. LRDC Annual Financial Report for the Years Ended September 30, 2015 and 2014 Lisa Wechsler, CPA.
 - The financial statements presented fairly and the changes in its net assets and cash flows ended in accordance with the generally accepted U.S. accounting principles.
 - There were three major financial events in the year: 1) The outstanding Parish Market loan was paid in full. The money was returned to the revolving loan fund for future use. 2) The outstanding Star Trax Year Round Pool lease was paid in full. \$100,000 of this revenue was placed in a deferred revenue account for future use by Jasper County. 3) Funds held for the Palm Key project were taken by Jasper County for another project.
 - The vacant building in Hampton County has been rented.
 - Copies of the Financial Report were distributed.
 - MOVED by Pete Hagood, seconded by Brian Flewelling to receive the report as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

MOVED by Gerald Dawson, seconded by Brian Flewelling to end the LRDC Meeting.
 Motion carried unanimously. The meeting concluded at 7:04pm and the LCOG Board Meeting resumed.

5. Reports

- 5.1. Finance Report for December 2015 Sherry Smith
 - Sherry Smith reviewed the Statement of Revenues and Expenditures for the period ending December 2015.
 - Copies of the monthly financial statement were distributed in agenda packets.
 - Revenues over expenditures were \$14,173.
 - 40% of the budget has been expended.
- 5.2. Community and Economic Development (C&ED) Report Michelle Knight
 - A \$2M EDA grant was approved for the Walterboro Water Treatment Plant
 - Five of seven CDBG grant applications submitted last October were approved for funding.
 - Copies of the monthly C&ED Report were distributed in agenda packets.
- 5.3. Director's Report Sabrena Graham
 - Beginning Jan. 1, 2016, The U.S. General Services Administration has reduced the mileage reimbursement rate from \$0.575 to \$0.54 per mile. LCOG will follow the same reduction.
 - Between January through March, Needs Assessment hearings led by LCOG staff will be conducted at town and county council meetings. These hearings are the basis by which LCOG can assist local governments in identifying funds for community projects.
 - LCOG received a Nat'l Association of Development Organizations (NADO) Innovation Award for facilitating the creation and development of the Lowcountry Regional Water System in Hampton County.
 - On February 18, COG Directors will meet with SC Senator Hugh Leatherman, Chairman
 of the Senate Finance Committee seeking support for increasing the funds given to
 COGs.
 - Input is requested in identifying the top five successes in the LCOG region over the past 50 years as well as the top five goals moving forward. This information will be used for the SC Association of Regional Councils (SCARC) 50th Anniversary Celebration later this year.
 - The Lowcountry Area Transportation Study (LATS) Committee has completed the Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) and the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
 The documents now go to the SCDOT Commission for approval.
 - The LCOG has formed a Citizen Participation Committee to cover civil rights issues at the COG. Rhonda Davis has been appointed as the Coordinator. If your agency is a recipient of federal funds it is required to implement a similar committee. LCOG can assist with implementation if needed.
 - Jonathan Sherwood of the LCOG Planning Department is now a certified planner having passed the exam managed by the American Institute of Certified Planners.
 - Technical College of the Lowcountry (TCL) president Dr. Richard Gough recently delivered the 2016 State of the College Report. One of the 2015/16 goals of the LCOG Board is to build a relationship with the TCL to help link education with workforce in the region. Copies of the report were distributed for information.

Purpose


This program is intended to enhance mobility for seniors and persons with disabilities by providing funds for programs to serve the special needs of transit-dependent populations beyond traditional public transportation services and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) complementary paratransit services.

Statutory References

49 U.S.C. Section 5310 / MAP-21 Section 20009

Eligible Recipients

- States (for all areas under 200,000 in population) and designated recipients.
- Subrecipients: states or local government authorities, private non-profit organizations, or operators of public transportation that receive a grant indirectly through a recipient.



Eligible Activities

- · At least 55% of program funds must be used on capital projects that are:
 - Public transportation projects planned, designed, and carried out to meet the special needs of seniors and individuals with disabilities when public transportation is insufficient, inappropriate, or unavailable.
- The remaining 45% may be used for:
 - o Public transportation projects that exceed the requirements of the ADA.
 - Public transportation projects that improve access to fixed-route service and decrease reliance by individuals with disabilities on complementary paratransit.
 - o Alternatives to public transportation that assist seniors and individuals with disabilities.

What's New?

- · Consolidates New Freedom Program and Elderly and Disabled Program.
- Operating assistance is now available under this program.

Funding

- Funds are apportioned for urbanized and rural areas based on the number of seniors and individuals with disabilities.
- Federal share for capital projects (including acquisition of public transportation services) is 80%.

Formula Grants for the Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities

Funding (cont.)

- Federal share for operating assistance is 50%.
- · Adopts New Freedom funding allocations:
 - o 60% to designated recipients in urbanized areas with a population over 200,000.
 - o 20% to states for small urbanized areas.
 - o 20% to states for rural areas.

Ongoing Provisions

- Local share may be derived from other federal (non-DOT) transportation sources or the Federal Lands Highways Program under 23 U.S.C. 204 (as in former Section 5310 program).
- · Permits designated recipients and states to carry out competitive process to select subrecipients.
- Recipients must certify that projects selected are included in a locally developed, coordinated public
 transit-human services transportation plan. The plan must undergo a development and approval process
 that includes seniors and people with disabilities, transportation providers, among others, and is
 coordinated to the maximum extent possible with transportation services assisted by other federal
 departments and agencies.
- Permits acquisition of public transportation services as a capital expense.
- Up to 10% of program funds can be used to administer the program, to plan, and to provide technical assistance.

- Budget Calendar The budget Calendar for the upcoming fiscal year 2016/2017 is attached for your review and approval. Executive Committee please check your calendars and confirm your availability for a budget work session on June 9 at 4:30pm. Let staff know as soon as possible if you have a conflict.
- 2. Request for Dues Increase As part of the FY16/17 budget process, LCOG is requesting an increase in dues from the four member counties. The rate has not been changed in over 20 years. Currently each county pays a rate of 0.60 per capita. The request is an increase to 0.75 per capita. \$148,195 is the current amount. The increase will provide about \$37,048 of additional revenue to the current rate of \$148,198 for a total \$185,244 of local funding. Dues are the only local funds the COG receives.
- 3. Section 5310 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Grants LCOG Transportation Committee The transportation Committee held two meetings with representatives from SCDOT Office of Public Transit and COG staff. Dues are the only local funds the COG receives. \$148,195 is the current amount. The increase will provide about \$37,048 of additional revenue to the COG for a total of \$185,244.

Below are some other points that support the requested increase for your information. I have been in contact with the County Administrators from the four counties and appear to have the support of everyone. Some were more certain of their support than others.

I certainly seek your support of the dues increase as you deliberate and approve your County budgets.

Supportive points to the request:

- 1. Have not requested an increase in over 20 years. Only requesting because truly needed for region.
- 2. LCOG has the lowest per capita rate (along with Pee Dee) of 9 COGS. {Waccamaw does not use a per capita rate.}
- Funds from dues are used as match for regional grants received at the COG and used to assist local gov't. These
 regional grants include: Aging Services, SCDOT Planning, and Economic Development Administration (EDA) Planning
 Grants. Match requirements are increasing.
- 4. When new grant opportunities are identified applications can be submitted if matching funds are available.
- Support operational expenses at the COG, allowing us to keep rates for service in local government contracts reasonable.

It is vital that you contact your House members this week and ask for increased funding in the Local Government Fund (LGF). The Ways and Means Committee managed to appropriate an additional \$766 million in recurring funds and \$457 million in non-recurring funds this year (\$1.2 billion dollars!) without providing a dime in additional LGF property tax relief.

I write this letter on behalf of the governing board of the Lowcountry Council of Governments. The board is comprised primarily of elected officials from the 25 local governments, counties and cities, in the four counties of Beaufort, Colleton, Hampton and Jasper that make up the region. The board voted unanimously to seek your support to "fully fund" the Local Government Fund as proposed by Governor Haley and as required by law.

The Local Government Fund is tax dollars that state statute requires legislators to return to counties and municipalities in exchange for providing state services. The law requires the state to divide 4.5 percent of the previous year's revenues among local governments. The state has given less than this amount since 2008.

The shortfall to the Lowcountry Region for the period FY2008 to FY2016 totals \$18,410,224. Per county the figures are as follows: Beaufort -\$11,736,165, Colleton - \$3,138,557, Hampton - \$1,706,907 and Jasper -\$1,828,595. The impact of the loss is felt equally among citizens irrespective of the county they reside in. Simply stated, our local governments cannot provide the level of services necessary to maintain quality of life for residents without the proper state funding.

On behalf of the local governments in the Lowcountry, the Lowcountry Council of Governments Board is asking you to support full funding of the Local Government Fund. Please let us know your position on this matter. A written reply will be greatly appreciated. You are invited to discuss this and other legislative matters during our regular board meetings that occur the fourth Thursday of each month at 6:00pm.

Both the House and Senate are out of session this Thursday and next week for Easter break. The House will also be out of session the week of April 4th. Next week is a golden opportunity to have a conversation with your legislators about the issues before them which affect the citizens you represent. A discussion of the Local Government Fund with your senator is especially timely.

State Budget and the Local Government Fund (LGF)

The House once again failed to provide any additional funding to the LGF. Not only did the House refuse to recognize this important property tax relief as a priority this year, House "Leadership" ensured that county property taxpayers would not see even a negligible increase in their LGF relief. This "Leadership" did prioritize additional mandates, like new DSS workers needing housing in county buildings, that will fall on county property taxpayers during the ensuing year.

The House hastily adopted the budget in a day and a half. The "Leadership" patted themselves on the back several times for their ability to jam through the most important legislation of the session in record time. If not for the requirement that every section have a roll call vote, the House likely could have adopted the budget in four or five hours. Most of the speed was a result of "Leadership's" unwillingness to allow any member that is not on Ways and Means to meaningfully amend the budget. Of around 109 proposed amendments, only three adopted amendments were proposed by members who did not serve on Ways and Means.

During the debate many members attempted to provide full-funding of the LGF. The Speaker ruled these amendments "Out of Order" because they did not reference the page and line in the budget from which the \$100 million required to fully fund the LGF was coming.

As referenced in previous Friday Reports, money was available for full funding. Specifically, the Ways and Means Committee did not allocate \$130 million dollars of the \$8 billion budget. However, the Speaker's ruling appears to indicate that once the Chairman spent the money earlier in the budget, amendments drawn to spend the money are out of order, even if offered earlier and drafted off of the Ways and Means budget.

Hopefully the people of South Carolina will elect clairvoyants to the House next year, because drafting amendments to the budget now requires members to know what amendments will be adopted (or not) before they even take up the floor debate.

Please thank the following members for both sponsoring and taking the well in support of increased funding to the LGF: Reps. Ott, Southard, Atwater, Bamberg, King, and Cobb-Hunter.

Also thank the following members for co-sponsoring amendments to increase LGF funding: Reps. George, Knight, Chumley, Hosey, Rivers, Crosby, Daning, W.J. McLeod, Kirby, Alexander, Yow, Gagnon, and Henegan.

A file with the two roll call sheets is available so you may know how your House member stood on the LGF.

This issue is too important for our property taxpayers to give up. We must take the fight to the Senate!

Call your senator this week and talk to them about the importance of the LGF. Please remind them:

- Many counties are cutting important services to their communities, especially in public safety, because of the limited
 options available for budget reductions. Some cuts are not based on priority or need, but rather if the General
 Assembly mandates the service or not.
- The General Assembly's failure to increase the LGF leads to artificial increases in millage rates. These increases
 often would not be necessary, or at least would be less, if the LGF was funded in accordance with the statute.
- Counties house state agencies, and pay for—but have no control over—the statewide court system, including the
 courthouse, magistrates, public defender, and solicitor. They also fund other state-controlled agencies, like the
 county election commission. These items must be paid out of property taxes, unless other revenue is provided.

Local Government Fund (LGF)

After the amendment for full funding was ruled out of order, Rep. Todd Atwater proposed an amendment which would have provided a \$4.5 Million increase in the LGF. Rep. Brian White moved to table his amendment. The result of this vote is as follows: A YEA VOTE MEANS THESE REPRESENTATIVES WOULD NOT SUPPORT A \$4.5 MILLION INCREASE IN THE LGF! A NO VOTE IS IN FAVOR OF AN INCREASE!

Lowcountry Council of Governments Five Successes, Five Goals 2016

Top 5 Successes

- Cherry Point Water/Sewer project in the Highway 170/278 corridor in southern Beaufort and Jasper Counties. EDA grant of \$1,000,000. The original project occurred 1994/95/96. Facilities constructed: 30" water line to Del Webb and other miscellaneous water and wastewater lines in the Cherry Point area. There were several subsequent projects dependent upon the infrastructure installed in the original project funded by investments from Beaufort Jasper Water Sewer Authority of \$52,000,000 and private investment of \$400,000,000+.
- 2. Joint Land Use Study (JLUS) program. A community-driven, cooperative, strategic planning process among Marine Corps Air Station Beaufort and Marine Corps Recruit Depot Parris Island; Beaufort County, the City of Beaufort and the Town of Port Royal; the Lowcountry Council of Governments; the State of South Carolina. The purpose is to promote community development that is compatible with the military training, testing, and operational missions; and seek ways to reduce operational impacts on adjacent lands.
 - The first JLUS was completed by the LCOG planning department in 2004 and recommendations implemented. A second JLUS was completed in 2015, and funding has been provided by OEA to begin work on implementation.
- Lowcountry Regional Water System is regionalism at its best and had a twenty-year
 gestation period. The system officially began its operations June 2013. The Lowcountry
 Regional Water System was formed as a joint water system and its members consist of the
 Towns of Brunson, Gifford, Hampton, Varnville, Yemassee and Hampton County.
- 4. LATS & MPO The Lowcountry Area Transportation Study was established in 2013 to be responsible for the new Metropolitan Planning Organization, the first new MPO in South Carolina in more than 20 years. LCOG's planning department administers the planning process that determines how the area's federal transportation dollars will be spent.
 - This project shows what can happen when a COG maintains solid long-term relationships with its local governments. The partner jurisdictions are Beaufort and Jasper counties, the cities of Beaufort and Hardeeville, the towns of Bluffton, Hilton Head and Port Royal.
- 5. The Lowcountry Regional Affordable Housing and HOME Consortium. The HOME Consortium was established in 2006 by a local initiative and all the jurisdictions came together on it. The MOU now includes all localities except one small town. This consortium allows direct allocation of housing funds to be managed locally by LCOG. The primary

activities are single family rehab, new construction (through Community Housing Development Organizations) and down payment assistance. The annual allocation requires a 25% match provided by our four counties.

Honorable Mentions

- 6. Infrastructure and building in Cypress Ridge Business-Industrial Park a 360 acre park purchased by Jasper County in 1997. Infrastructure water, sewer and roads initially \$1,300,000 were funded by grants from EDA \$667,500, CDBG \$396,000 the Coordinating Council \$150,000 and local funds. The park is home to several business today. Subsequent projects dependent upon the infrastructure include a new elementary school and subdivision.
- 7. AAA Comprehensive Assessment Program In July of 2013, the Area Agency on Aging (AAA) embarked on implementing a region-wide, Comprehensive Assessment Program for the purpose of better serving our senior population with a full range of available services. This process enables the agency to truly undertake a "person-centered" approach to serving the senior population.

This system has led to increases in clients and services provided. This program is now being reviewed by the state's Office on Aging for replication in all ten regions.

Top 5 Goals

- Jobs/Youth/Education Develop a skilled workforce to increase the employability of the region's citizens, particularly the youth.
- 2. Roads/transportation Improve access to resources and services in the region
- Aging and Disability Resource Services Increase the awareness of resources and services offered in the region, and increase the number of seniors reached by the programs.
- 4. Housing/Home Improvements Increase the number of citizens in the region living in safe, affordable homes
- Take full advantage of the Promise Zone designation that impacts the region by working in partnership with the lead entity Southern Carolina Alliance to implement a strategic plan that supports growth and development in the region.


