IT'S HURRICANE SEASON... are you prepared?



Hurricane Season runs from June 1 - November 30

Beaufort County is urging all residents to prepare **now**, before a storm hits. This is your opportunity to see what long-term storm preparations residents can make now to make sure they are finalized and ready, should a storm head our way.

Know Your Zone

In South Carolina, state and local officials issue hurricane evacuations based on zones in coastal counties. Know your hurricane evacuation zone instantly with the SC Emergency Manager mobile app and Hurricane.sc, South Carolina's online hurricane guide.

Prepare Your Home

Do a safety check to make sure your home is best able to withstand the effects of a hurricane. Have your roof inspected, double check hurricane shutters and make sure your insurance policies cover the types of damages

hurricanes can cause. Make a list and take photos of your belongings as records. Check your insurance policies now to make sure your policies cover what you need them to.

Remember Your Route.

Be aware of the closest hurricane evacuation route ahead of the upcoming hurricane season. This will allow for a more efficient and safer route out of the hurricane's path. Once you've learned your route, stick with it and remember it. Rely on the blue hurricane evacuation signs, not GPS.

Beaufort County Emergency Management Division

The Beaufort County Sheriff's Office is the lead agency for emergencies in Beaufort County. BCSO will operate the county's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) during a critical incident. While the EOC is activated, it is staffed by municipal representatives, county officials, school officials, military bases, and organizations that fulfill critical functions.

Download the Everbridge app to receive up-to-date information on matters of public safety from the Beaufort County Sheriff's Office including evacuation and weather alerts.





Don't forget your pets!

Keep your companions safe during dangerous storms. If you do not evacuate, keep your pets indoors. Tethering outdoors during named storms is prohibited by County ordinance. If you do evacuate:

- Bring them with you
- Plan your destination
- Trasnport them in a secure carrier and keep larger dogs leashed
- Bring water and food
- Ensure all animals have ID tags
- Keep an eye out for other animals in trouble

PROPOSED 2024 SALES AND USE TAX REFERENDUM MOVES TO THE BALLOT

The choice is yours, Beaufort County Voters.

After five public input sessions, multiple committee meetings, and one workshop, Beaufort County Council voted to place on the ballot in November a Sales and Use Tax Referendum. This proposed initiative would fund currently underfunded infrastructure projects, as well as dirt road paving and resurfacing, safety projects, and emergency evacuation improvements. If approved by voters, the Transportation Sales Tax will replace the existing Green Space Sales Tax, and the sales tax rate would remain at 7%.

278 CORRIDOR PROJECT

The Hilton Head Town Council granted municipal consent to the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) and submitted a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to Beaufort County on June 28, 2024. The MOU is currently with Beaufort County Council, to be worked through our established MOU coordination process. Beaufort County will continue to pursue funding for this project through coordinated efforts with SCDOT and the State Infrastructure Bank. Beaufort County Council has also included funds for the 278 Corridor project in the Proposed 2024 Transportation Sales Tax Referendum, which will be on the ballot this November.

These combined efforts are great indications of the partnerships and progress made on this critical project. Beaufort County remains committed to working with all stakeholders towards the best solution for our citizens and residents, and we thank the Town of Hilton Head for their teamwork to get this accomplished.

BEAUFORT COUNTY GREEN SPACE PROGRAM

Beaufort County voters decided to fund the very first Green Space Tax in South Carolina at 1% in November of 2022. The purpose of this program is to preserve open space, to protect critical and natural resources, and/or to provide land for recreation. The program allows for the purchase of development rights and fee simple interest in lands that are threatened by development, which, if it were to occur, would have detrimental effects on land use patterns, traffic, public safety, stormwater runoff, water quality or other conservation objectives.

Now that the Program has been collecting funds for almost 2 years, we are seeing projects begin to move through the application process. The very first proj-

ect was the preservation of Gregorie Neck, a move that ensured 4400 acres at the headwaters of the Port Royal Sound would permanently be protected. The next vital project currently going through the application process is the 26-acre property in Hilton Head known as Mitchelville.

The Mitchelville property boasts vital maritime forests, waterfront acreage, archeological importance, and great cultural significance. The proposed preservation of this land, part of the historically significant Mitchelville Tract, represents a major step toward preserving the Island of Hilton Head's heritage. These 26 acres are adjacent to other Town-owned properties like Barker Field, Fish Haul Beach Park, and Mitchelville Freedom Park, stretches from Fish Haul Road to the beach area along Port Royal Sound.

Mitchelville holds profound historical importance as the first self-governed town of formerly enslaved people in America. At its peak, Mitchelville was home to 1,500 to 3,000 residents, embodying the promise of freedom and opportunity for African Americans of diverse origins.

ST. JAMES CHURCH RELOCATION

The St. James Church congregation is currently in the process of relocating due to construction of the planned expansion at the Hilton Head Island Airport. Senator Tom Davis has partnered with Beaufort County to facilitate these efforts through the allocation of state funds in the amount of \$4M. The project is now moving forward after several years of inactivity due to renewed collaborative efforts between church leaders, the FAA, the Airport Board, Town of Hilton Head, Beaufort County Council, and Senator Davis.

WORKFORCE HOUSING PARTNERSHIP PLANNED FOR BLUFFTON

Beaufort County is excited to announce a groundbreaking partnership aimed at addressing the critical need for affordable workforce housing and medical office space in our community.

The development project will be a collaborative effort between Beaufort County, the Town of Bluffton, and Beaufort Memorial Hospital (BMH) that aims to create 125-150 affordable housing units and approximately 25,000 square feet of medical office space. The property earmarked for the project is located at 333 and 335 Buckwalter Parkway and was owned by St. Andrew By-The-Sea United

Methodist Church on Hilton Head.

Over the past year and a half, Beaufort County has been in discussions with St. Andrew By-The-Sea to acquire property for the intended purpose of developing affordable workforce housing. St. Andrew By-The-Sea generously agreed to sell the property at a reduced price to support this vital initiative.

The Town of Bluffton is supportive of the construction of affordable housing units and needed medical facilities. The Town's Affordable Housing Committee has reviewed the proposed use and is supportive of the reuse and partnership. The workforce housing units are intended to be made available to the public and Beaufort Memorial would establish services in the medical office space.

PORT ROYAL BRANCH LIBRARY NOW OPEN TO PUBLIC

The Beaufort County Library opened its sixth and newest branch located in the Town of Port Royal on Wednesday, August 21, at 2 p.m.

A Grand Opening and Ribbon-Cutting Celebration was held on Saturday, August 24, followed by the branch's first storytime. Guests were invited to tour the building, talk with library staff, register for a library card, and check out materials.

The branch boasts child, teen and adult collections of more than 5,000 materials, including books, movies and more. The facility includes dedicated meeting and conference rooms for the community to use and technological resources, including public computers and a self-service scan, fax, and email station.

The branch's regular hours of operation will be Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Friday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. It will be closed on Sundays.

Veterans face a unique set of challenges

BEAUFORT COUNTY VETERANS AFFAIRS HOSTS STAND DOWN EVENT FOR HOMELESS AND AT-RISK VETERANS

Beaufort County Veterans Affairs partnered with The Connecting Point to sponsor their first-ever Stand Down event on August 16, 2024.

According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, Stand Downs are typically one- to three-day events during which VA staff and volunteers provide food, clothing and health screenings to homeless and at-risk Veterans. In addition,

that can contribute to certain risk factors. Veterans also receive referrals for health care, housing solutions, employment, substance use treatment, mental health counseling and other essential services.

This was the first Stand Down event to be held in Beaufort County and included food, clothing and health screening for all veterans who participated. Referrals were given for healthcare, mental health, haircuts, employment, housing solutions, substance abuse and showers and other essentials.

INAUGURAL YOUTH SOCCER PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS LAUNCHES IN BEAUFORT COUNTY



In an exciting development for the community, a new youth soccer program tailored specifically for children with special needs ages 4 to 10 kicked off in Beaufort County this fall. This initiative is a collaborative partnership between SOAR Special Recreation, Beaufort County Public Schools, and Beaufort County Parks and Recreation.

The program started on Sunday, September 8, and will continue every Sunday for five more weeks at a local middle school. The league is designed to provide a nurturing and supportive environment where children can learn the fundamentals of soccer while fostering social skills and building friendships. Each 90-minute session includes various soccer stations designed to accommodate children with physical and cognitive impairments. A key component of the program is the one-on-one pairing of at least one volunteer with each child, ensuring that every participant receives personalized attention and support throughout the sessions. Each session culminates in a fun and engaging scrimmage, allowing children to showcase their skills in a supportive and encouraging atmosphere.

While registration is closed for the current session, Beaufort County Parks and Recreation will look to partner with SOAR and Beaufort County Public Schools to provide additional programs in 2025. 2024 TRANSPORTATION SALES & USE TAX REFERENDUM



THE DECISION IS YOURS, BEAUFORT COUNTY VOTERS

The goals of the proposed 2024 Sales and Use Tax Referendum (the penny tax) are to address Beaufort County infrastructure needs through the completion of transportation and mobility projects amidst growth in our region. According to the latest census data, South Carolina is the fastest-growing state in the nation, and Beaufort County is one of the fastest-growing counties within South Carolina. The referendum question, to be placed on the ballot in November 2024, will ask voters to approve a one percent (1%) sales and use tax in Beaufort County beginning the following year (2025) and continuing for ten (10) years, or until \$950 million in funds are raised, whichever occurs first.

Pilot Program Begins with AccessNow to Increase Accessibility Awareness at Beaufort County Passive Parks

Beaufort County has partnered with AccessNow, to complete a pilot project enhancing accessibility awareness at Beaufort County's Passive Parks. This is the first project of its kind in South Carolina, focusing on informing the public about accessibility on three popular passive parks: Widgeon Point, Crystal Lake, and Fort Fremont. AccessNow's mission is to establish a go-to resource for accessibility information. Their platform empowers people to discover a world of accessible opportunities, make better decisions, and remove barriers.

The AccessNow mapping project includes important accessibility information including parking and restroom information, as well as any potential navigational hazards. These park accessibility maps can be viewed from the Passive Parks Department properties webpage, or the AccessNow website.

The Passive Parks Department also offers three all-terrain wheelchairs free for public use. These chairs can be reserved through filling out and submitting a print form available here, and an online registration form will be available soon.

As part of its continued efforts to reduce the stigma surrounding alcohol and substance misuse, Beaufort County is excited to announce that the department providing treatment services and programs has rebranded into Nexus Care of Beaufort County.



Since its beginning in 1974, the department has helped families, individuals, and the community overcome addiction and substance misuse. For some, these programs and services are a requirement of the law, for others the programs are a requirement for life. The department's mission is to reduce the negative impact of alcohol and drugs in Beaufort County by providing its citizens with person-centered prevention, intervention, treatment, and recovery services.

The new logo is intentionally aligned with the Beaufort County Government emblem: the petals comprising the nexus symbol are taken from the waves present in the government seal. Each one symbolizes a facet of the continuum of care offered by the department: prevention, intervention, treatment, and recovery. The color scheme evokes our natural surroundings and culture, and the tagline Healthy People. Thriving Communities. Brighter Futures. echoes the vital mission of the department.
